WHAT IS A WATERSHED?

A watershed is an area of land that drains into a lake or river.

Stand at the shore of Swartswood Lake and look around you to the tops of the mountains that surround the lake. The approximately twelve thousand acres that you see make up Swartswood's watershed. All precipitation falling in this area, with the exception of that absorbed by vegetation will make its way into the lakes or into the streams which feed the two lakes. This can occur as simple run-off after a storm or by means of groundwater, which enters the lakes via springs.

Unfortunately, this drainage brings not only water, but other material and pollutants as well. These might include dissolved fertilizers, soil particles (silt), pesticides, herbicides and hydrocarbon oils.

The primary goal of the Swartswood Lakes and Watershed Association is to preserve the water quality of the lakes, streams, wetlands and its watershed through education, management grants and the promotion of environmentally sound practices by all who use the lakes.

Swartswood Lakes contribute to the quality of life for everyone in the area. What their future holds depends on how they are used by all of us. Won't you join with your friends and neighbors to help protect and preserve this natural area so that it may continue to be enjoyed by future generations?

MEMBERSHIP MEETINGS

The members meet twice per year, usually in May and in September.

HISTORY

The Swartswood Lakes Association was formed in 1992 when a group of concerned citizens banded together to preserve Swartswood Lake. Several years later the organization was expanded to include Little Swartswood Lake and the watershed of both. In this short time period, the association has built an impressive list of accomplishments:

***with Swartswood State Park

These grants all require matching funds. Fortunately these are available through volunteer hours which are considered "inkind" matching funds. Each year in excess of 2500 such hours are contributed through the efforts of the Paradise Fishing Club, Emmons Lane Association, Swartswood Yacht Club, Little Swartswood Lake, Camp Lou Henry Hoover and Camp Aldersgate. All of whom work in conjunction with SLWA. Future projects include:

- Control of American Lotus herbicide treatment of lake as a joint project between residents and the State Park
